FROM THE PRINCIPAL

The 'leaders of tomorrow' at St Catherine's were announced this week, and it gave me great pleasure on Tuesday to congratulate Mackenzie Leyden as the 2017 School Captain and Georgie Sitch as the School Vice-Captain. The girls will be well supported by a Student Executive comprising of Alecka Garrett, Isabella King, Sophie Seng Hpa and Angela Sexton.

The School has always regarded leadership, service and responsibility integral elements of a girl's education. It is important that every girl experiences some form of leadership whilst at School and is prepared for responsibilities. To this end, leadership skills are nurtured in every girl, commencing with their Year 7 Beyond Boundaries experiences. This development continues across the years and is formalised through the Leadership Diploma offered in Year 9 and Year 10.

The Diploma is a unique qualification to St Catherine's and offers students the opportunity to strengthen the School community and to refine their own leadership skills. The Leadership Diploma incorporates all components of the Years 9 and 10 curriculum and recognises students' involvement in and achievement from their academic and co-curricular programs. It drives the girls to be organised, proactive, altruistic, insightful and empathetic, with the opportunity to make a tangible difference to their School and local community.

Encouraging students to step outside their comfort zones and become involved in new and different activities inside and outside the School is a major objective of the Leadership Diploma. The journey provides students with a strong insight, not only into School and the wider community, but also themselves through the personal reflection required for the Diploma. Students must successfully complete a list of criteria which includes developing positive relationships, involvement in mentoring programs, Community Service and environment programs, performance and public speaking, Outdoor Education and being a positive role model. Students who complete the Diploma are then eligible for leadership selection in Year 11.

The process of leadership selection is intentionally lengthy and thorough, requiring a written application, two rounds of interviews and a brief speech delivered to the student body. This week, the shortlisted candidates were asked to convey in their Assembly speech what they value in leadership through a reflection on the attributes, and recognition of the qualities, of a St Catherine's Old Girl recognised as a Nil Magum Nisi Bonum (NMNB) recipient.

The photo above is the shortlisted candidates reading the NMNB profiles last Friday as they made their selection of which St Catherine's Old Girl to research for their speech. The girls' speeches on Monday provided an enlightening reminder of the strength, tenacity and character of the women who grace the walls of Sherren House.

Happy Father's Day

I wish all our St Catherine's Dads a joyful day on Sunday, filled with much love and care from their daughters. I came across this research about fathers this week and share for you below:

Fathers are the key to improving girls' health, fitness and wellbeing.

A University of Newcastle study has found that a unique father-daughter exercise program not only improves girls' fitness, confidence, resilience and social-emotional wellbeing, but also strengthens fathers' parenting skills and their understanding of the importance of the father-daughter bond. With less than 10% of girls entering high school able to perform basic skills such as kicking, catching and throwing a ball, and less than 20% being sufficiently physically active, it is easy to see why teenage girls are far more likely to drop out of playing sports than boys. This not only has damaging impacts on girls' health and fitness, but also on body image and self-esteem.

Under the world-first DADEE program (Dads and Daughters Exercising and Empowered), 155 primary school age girls and their 115 fathers took part in a wide variety of traditional and non-traditional sporting pursuits including hockey, soccer, touch football, basketball, tennis, martial arts and boxing, as well as rough and tumble play, and games to improve aerobic and muscular fitness.

During the eight-week program, fathers also learnt evidence-based parenting strategies for optimising their daughters' physical and mental health. The importance of 'equalist' parenting was emphasised — where girls and boys are given equal encouragement to remain physically active throughout their lives — and fathers learnt about the positive impact of female role models and the negative impact of 'pinkification'. In fact, the DADEE program deliberately reversed the usual stereotypes so that girls' t-shirts and drink bottles were blue and fathers' t-shirts and drink bottles were pink.

Not only did girls improve their sporting skills and physical activity levels, but the DADEE program impacted positively on their self-esteem and resilience. By moving the focus from 'pretty' to 'healthy', it was found that girls improved their positive self-concept and gained a newfound physical confidence. Lead researcher, Professor Phil Morgan, from the University of Newcastle's Priority Research Centre for Physical Activity and Nutrition, says that the girls' physical confidence "was partly attributed to a growing awareness of gender biases and a refusal to buy into traditional stereotypes".

For fathers, not only did they improve their own physical fitness and learn 'how to teach' their daughters sporting skills, but they also reported increased parenting skills and strong improvements in family bonding and understanding of the importance of the father-daughter relationship. In fact, when fathers were asked about the most beneficial part of the program, the two most common responses were that they could see an improvement in their daughter's social-emotional wellbeing and that their father-daughter bond had strengthened.

This week I also congratulate the following students for outstanding achievements:


Flynn O'Brien in Year 9 was recently selected as a National finalist in the renowned Future Problem Solving Program in Australia.

Bookweek and Four Leaf Clover Program Action

The fun and learning was so evident in the shared activity involving the Year 4 and 4YO ELC program students. The Four Leaf Clover Program is one of many varied activities the year levels enjoy together and Book Week was no exception.

Rocket Writing

We love learning how to become better writers in Year 1. Learning to write is a complex skill which requires students to think about a topic, sequence ideas and write a piece which voices feelings, enthusiasm, a personal recount or share information. Sentences are formed within a structure which requires a good understanding of punctuation and a strong focus of the sentence making sense. We are learning to use as many describing words as possible, as we begin to understand the importance of building an interesting and engaging story for the reader.

We have recently introduced Rocket Writing. The only instruction given is to write about an image and what inspires our learners when viewing the image. The second dimension is sound, for example a camp fire crackling, the sound of water in a waterfall or the sound of a snow blizzard. The writing then begins!

Through the use of the visual image and sound, the beginning of a narrative, a recount, an information report, a poem or a song transpires. There is silence in the room and all that can be heard is the sound from the image. When it is time to put pencils down, excitement lights up the classroom as there is a willingness to share their work with their peers.

Fire Safety in Prep

During Term 3 the Firemen from Windsor Fire Station visited the Prep classroom to deliver the MFB 'Fire Ed' program to St Catherine's Prep students. The Program helps children develop a basic understanding of fire safety and to view firefighters as community helpers.

Students analysed illustrations of different fire scenarios and worked as a group to identify the safe and unsafe features before determining if it was a good/safe fire or a bad/unsafe fire. The key message in each image was the importance of an adult being present and in charge of the fire.

Children were taught the importance of smoke alarms and asked to check their own smoke alarms at home with their parents to ensure they were in working order. They learnt the 'get down low - go, go, go' phrase and had the homework task of finding a safe meeting place outside their home where they could meet their family members in case of a fire emergency. Students were interested to know they should not take any items from home with them when they leave their house. They also practiced calling the emergency phone number 000.

During both visits the firefighters were called out to real life emergencies, which was very interesting to observe as they listened to their radio call and prepared by putting on their protective clothing and driving off with sirens and lights going. On returning to the School, the girls were able to ask questions in relation to the emergency and learnt valuable lessons from each of these stories.

A highlight during the visit was trying on the helmets and spraying water from the firehose. This was a special treat at the conclusion of the program. To thank the firefighters who visited, Prep students decided to write their own letters. The letters have been compiled in a 'thank you' book which will be sent to the Windsor Fire Station this week.

Building Resilience through Global Engagement

The wellbeing theme weEngage, has certainly been evident this term with the Year 9 cohort. The students have had an amazing opportunity to engage globally through the Heyington to Highland trip. This journey provided them with the opportunity to work with Fijian children in schools and engage with the Fijian families in their day to day lives.

They were able to immerse themselves in a very different culture and come to understand the different living standards. Through the immersion, St Catherine's students were able to discover the importance of some of the UN sustainable goals such as good health and wellbeing, gender equality, clean water and sanitation, quality education and sustainable communities.

It also provided the girls an opportunity for personal growth, as well as help in the formation of their identity during this challenging transition from adolescence to adulthood. Students were able to forge new friendships, build resilience and find strength within themselves to step outside of their comfort zone. The girls absolutely loved the experience with many commenting on wanting to return to visit their Fijian family, as well as the opportunity it provided them to form new friendships.

Upon return from this experience, students are now reflecting on their experiences, and being challenged to consider their learning experiences and how it will influence their interests, career goals and intentions.

Along with the Heyington to Highland experience the students are also engaging locally. A requirement of the Leadership Diploma is for students to complete 12 hours of community service. Many of them are currently completing this component, with girls working at a number of places, including Darnlee Residential Care and Salvation Army retail outlets. Some students also completed community service hours by involving themselves in the Red Cross Door Knock, earlier in the year.

BEYOND BOUNDARIES: GROWTH THROUGH ADVENTURE AND CHALLENGE



"My formula: dream, risk and humour"

Our sequential Beyond Boundaries Outdoor Education program focuses on developing healthy risk taking behaviours and strategies and helps educate girls about actual risks, perceived risks, and responsibilities required in day-to-day life.

A research report by Girlguiding UK found there is a thin line between educating girls about the risks to their safety and creating disproportionate fear in them – but as a society we need to get this right. It is equally important that girls are not over-protected and that they learn to take a level of responsibility for their own safety.

Redefining risk: Girls shout out! Relevant rules for today's girls.

Girls take some risks because they are not aware they exist. Many of these risks are related to new technology and therefore unique to this generation. Girls are also aware of certain risks but choose to take them anyway, therefore we need to teach them how to make responsible decisions about their safety, enabling them to judge for themselves whether a risk is acceptable or not.

Risky Behaviour?

The report found that girls have internalised safety messages about traditional risks such as 'stranger danger'. Existing rules to keep girls safe focus on avoiding these traditional risks, however, girls are given disproportionate freedom to access adult media including magazines, films and video games.

Girls' perceptions of risk are influenced by the adults in their lives and by what they see reported in the media. Older girls acknowledge that the sheer volume of news available creates a heightened awareness of danger but does not necessarily prove that the world is more dangerous.

Ironically, in real life girls often engage in actions, such as taking shortcuts through alleyways and listening to iPods while travelling alone at night, which actually put them at risk of encountering the dangers they fear.


Attitudes to Risk

Younger girls measure risk in terms of physical danger. However, older girls are aware of the concept that there are both positive and negative risks. Ability to manage risk improves with age and older girls are less likely to find themselves in situations they cannot handle.

Girls actively seek opportunities to experience risk in order to challenge themselves and are happy to accept the possible negative outcomes of this. By and large, threats are still perceived to come from other people rather than as a result of their own actions.

Online life presents a large cause for concern. Girls are prepared to take risks online that they would not consider in the physical world and mistakenly feel they are safer when using and sharing details on social networking site than in fact they are.

Taking Responsibility

However, they are unlikely to plan in advance to reduce risk – partly because they don't necessarily recognise an unsafe situation or activity, such as using a mobile phone when travelling alone at night.

Girls expressed a desire to learn to handle risk through experience in controlled circumstances. They also valued quality education and having trusted adults both in and outside of the home who they can speak to.

Rules are not uniformly perceived as negative, provided they are understandable and subject to an open dialogue involving both girls and adults. Girls felt that relevant, rational rules learned when young laid the foundations for commonsense approaches to life when they were older.

Good Risks and Bad Risks

As girls grow older their attitude to risk changes. Younger girls identify risk as physical threat – avoid the risky activity and you stay safe. Older girls understand that it is not always necessary to avoid risk; instead it is possible to modify your behaviour to mitigate its negative consequences. And in some cases the benefits of an activity outweigh any potential risk entirely.

University of Tasmania Scigo Trip

The cores are analysed to determine thousands of years of Antarctic weather and can also be used to track global warming. We also observed microorganisms from the Southern Oceans, learnt about the uses of drones in Antarctica and the benefits of tracking albatross in sub Antarctica. Finally, we had the opportunity to explore the University campus. We used an interactive 3D landscape table to build mountains and rivers, as well as learnt how to build our own Apps. Overall, the trip was an entertaining and interesting weekend of Science that I thoroughly enjoyed. It was also great to meet other students from around Australia who also enjoy Science.



