Supporting St Catherine's Girls

The St Catherine's School Foundation members were invited to a 'back of house tour' of AFL House this week, incorporating an evening stroll onto the flood lit grounds of Etihad Stadium. Australian Football League Chief Executive, Mr Gillon McLachlan, also provided an interesting address about the future direction of the AFL.

McLachlan is the key driver behind the creation of AFL Media, demonstrating an intuitive grasp of how the media industry is rapidly changing before our very eyes, in particular the growth of digital media. Located at AFL House in the Docklands, AFL Media boasts a growing web platform and strong digital strategy reflecting the need to provide an interactive and timely fan advantage. Commencing in only 2010, the AFL Digital Media is now the number one sports platform in the country with the AFL App the most sourced sporting app in the southern hemisphere with 1.2 millon users in 2015 (a 20th of the Australian population). AFL Media employs 115 people in their digital team, less than 10 are women. McLachlan was quick to point out the growing needs of IT skills, and effectively provided a firsthand example of why encouraging girls within STEM fields, and, in particular, the IT industry, is essential. As the father of daughters, Mr McLachlan, is delighted with the direction of ensuring girls also have the opportunity to play Aussie Rules Football at a national level.

This year, the 2016 Youth Girls National Championships held in Melbourne in the first week of May, provided teenage girls with an opportunity to play on the biggest stage in football. In 2010, there were 10,000 girls involved in playing AFL, this figure has grown by 22% year-on-year with 18,000 playing in 2015.

This year, St Catherine's entered a Senior team in the GSV weekly AFL competition, drawing a loyal crowd of parents each week to support the girls' footy pursuits. Whilst still an emerging sport at St Catherine's, the possibility of playing at a National level just became that much more obtainable.

Thank you to the Music staff, ably led by Mrs Jenny Mathers and Mr Tim Collins, and the group of students who also entertained the crowd at the Foundation event this week, Amber Chapman, Phoebe Edwards, Ingrid Crossing, Alexandra Cullen, Georgina Cheale, Frances Curtis and Sona Kocharyan. Their jazz repertoire was highly professional and a great collaboration between staff and students.

At the Foundation event this week, Foundation Board President, Mrs Anne Court and Foundation Board Chair, Mr Wayne Kent, graciously acknowledged the outstanding contribution of recently retired Board members, Mrs Ann Hyam and Ms Louise Lampard.

Year 6 Work with Australian Choral Composer - Paul Jarman

Last week in the Junior School, Year 6 students were fortunate enough to spend time working closely with the widely acclaimed Australian Choral Composer, Paul Jarman. As part of our 120th anniversary celebrations, Paul was invited to Barbreck to work on creating and composing a Junior School song.

Paul is a composer, multi-instrumentalist and choir master. He has written over 100 commissioned works for ensembles, festivals and events which have been performed around the world in venues such as the White House, the opening of the World Rugby Cup and at the London Olympics. Paul has been commissioned to write about some of the most inspiring people of our time including Jessica Watson, Helen Keller, Ernest Shackleton, Mary MacKillop and many others.

Last year at our Junior School Music concert, the entire Junior School sang a piece by Paul Jarman called *Follow Your Dreams*. This song celebrated the life and achievements of Jesse Martin, a young Australian from Melbourne who sailed unassisted around the world. The Barbreck students remembered this piece and were very excited to hear the news of Paul's visit.

Students in Year 6 spent several days working closely with Paul, reflecting, writing and discussing the things that make St Catherine's a special place to them.

The sessions were productive and creatively exciting as both students and composer strived to touch upon the things that make our School unique. Students wrote about friendships, trust and supporting those around you, having the courage to be yourself, being women of the future, positivity and so much more. It was interesting to note that the blue ribbon element of our School uniform, and all that it represents to a St Catherine's girl, featured strongly in the students' writing and discussions.

The girls were highly engaged in the experience and made a special connection with our resident composer. We cannot wait to share the end result with the wider School community. This collaborative piece will be premiered later in the year.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF CURRICULUM **INNOVATION AND DESIGN**

Pottery, Parenting, Learning and Teaching

This week has been dominated by two events. One a national curriculum event, the NAPLAN, and the other, a global event, Mother's Day. Mother's Day is a day when all the mums can put up their feet, have breakfast in bed and be waited upon (in theory!). It is also the day of gifts. Alternatively, a NAPLAN day is one where your children cannot put their feet up, cannot have breakfast in bed and are not waited upon (even in theory!). Yet it is also a day full of gifts!

Let me explain.

The gifts your children give you on Mother's Day can be interesting – but they can also be thought provoking. One particular year I remember watching very young students making cups on a potter's wheel, their own strange creations that were to be given to mum on Mother's Day. I sat and watched, but in the end I could not resist any longer – suddenly I found myself at the potter's wheel!

It started off easy, but just ten minutes later, I looked like a victim of an industrial accident, covered from head to toe in wet clay, fingers hurting and bleeding and a crater whirling round where my cup should be. I am meant to be watching the expert but if I take my eyes off this spinning clay for an instant the whole thing is liable to fly off the wheel, and replaster the ceiling. Eventually though, something resembling a cup was made.

In a way, teaching is just pottery with students (and NAPLAN is part of the clay!). Learning theory purports that children are perfect raw materials and teaching and learning simply moulds them. It all starts off fairly smoothly, so the theory states, but the task gets trickier. Students grow and grow and soon good teachers are working flat out to keep up with them. Then some students start to lurch out of control and little eccentricities begin to appear. Rough edges form and each time you smooth out one lump, another appears. Points of instability develop, or patches where they are too strong. As a teacher, you want to stop and smooth each one out, but schools and curriculum do not slow down long enough and your child's learning continues to form.

Here is what I have learnt about pottery, parenting, learning and teaching:

- •all are messy, awkward, and can leave you with mud on your face but all are exceptional
- •they are all unrelenting and totally absorbing
- •it is impossible to make identical pieces
- •success always lies in time spent forming a solid base
- strength or fragility are simply matters of perspective
- •if you mess it up, you cannot really give the end result away to the relatives for Christmas!

So, a very happy belated Mother's Day and a very well done for NAPLAN.


Rotary Public Speaking Competition

Bond University High School Mooting Competition

After several weeks of preparation, Eve Alexiadis (Senior Counsel), Sophie Sitch (Junior Counsel) and Georgina McNab (Solicitor) all participated in the Bond University High School Mooting Competition at the Administrative Appeals Tribunal. The girls were mentored with preparations for the moot, by Old Girl Grëtel Cannon ('12).

A moot is a legal argument conducted by opposing teams before one or more judges with the application of legal rules to factual situations. The competition is decided by assessing the advocacy skills of the participants rather than the merits of the case.

At the moot, St Catherine's students were required to present their prepared case materials while also thinking on their feet to answer the numerous questions given to them from the judges. These interruptions from the judges were well handled by the girls as they presented a strong case.

At the end of the session the judges commented positively on their ability to cope in this situation. They also felt the students presented with good pace and tone in their voices during argument. They were also impressed with their ability to cope with ongoing questioning, and felt the girls were well researched and prepared, showing very good knowledge of the case materials.



In another of our articles of interest (link to full article here) "Tony" writes:


If you are like me, you want your kid(s) to complete their K-12 education with far more than factual knowledge and an ability to score well on tests. You don't believe that your child's success in life depends primarily on cognitive skills — the type of intelligence that is measured on IQ tests and such. You don't believe that school should be primarily focused on stuffing kids' brains with as much factual knowledge as possible, but instead is focused on growing skills and mindsets that will last a lifetime. Psychological traits that include [but not limited to] patience to persist at a tough (and perhaps boring) task, the ability to delay gratification and the curiosity and grit to problem solve, just to name a few. And the musical instrument in your child's hand could be the key to learning those skills.

In the Music Department at St Catherine's School we offer any student the solo, ensemble and theoretical help they need, and motivate the girls in any way that we can. Whilst a few wonderful students are intrinsically motivated, most are not, and we do ask that parents take the learning of an instrument (including voice), or commitment to an ensemble, seriously. Athletics Victoria All Schools Cross Country Relay Championships

On Saturday 30 April the St Catherine's Cross Country Team headed to Jells Park to contest the Athletics Victoria All Schools Cross Country Relay Championships. This event draws school teams from all over the state, making for great racing conditions. St Catherine's contested all age groups, with 40 girls competing strongly and improving their individual times and team placings. Through teamwork St Catherine's finished fifth overall in the state, and were ranked second within the GSV School competition behind Ruyton. This puts us in good stead to challenge the GSV Cross Country Championships in coming weeks.

Juniors (Under 14 and 16)

Having trained extremely well over the first part of Term 2 our Junior Teams in the Under 14 and 16 age groups entered the competition with plenty of promise. Our U14 Navy Team of Francesca Demetriou, Ava Lansell, Alexandra Demetriou and Chloe Joubert showed confidence mixing it with the best schools in the states, finishing a close fourth. Our U14 Blue and Gold Teams displayed the strong sense of teamwork we have been working towards finishing 11th and 17th respectively, beating many schools' first teams in the process. Francesca Demetriou recorded the fastest U14 St Catherine's three kilometre time of the day finishing in 12.03, while Eliza Mailer showed huge improvement running a 13.18 around the course. In the Under 16s our Gold Team of Annelise Cody, Isabella Bufé, Isobel Tanner and Imogen Rice finished eighth overall, improving the Under 16 Team result of 12th in 2015. Our Blue and Navy Teams finished 21st and 24th respectively. Isabella Bufé ran the quickest U16 St Catherine's time, running 12.15, while Imogen Rice posted a strong 12.28 in her first race for St Catherine's.

Seniors (Under 18 and 20)

Our Senior Teams in the Under 18 and 20 competitions worked hard and gained valuable race experience that shall put them in good stead for the races to come. Our Under 18 Blue Team of Sarah Wilson, Juliet Grant, Eleanor Millear and Isabelle Dann finished 12th in a strong Under 18s field. While our Gold and Navy Team showed the strong depth of runners we have finishing 17th and 22nd respectively. Isabelle Dann recorded the fastest U18 St Catherine's four kilometre time of the day finishing in 18.08, While Sarah Wilson showed huge improvement running a 18.32. Our Under 20 Team of Georgie Gleeson, Alexandra Stopp, Elsa Robertson and Ella Swann ran a fantastic team race nudging out their close rivals Melbourne Girls Grammar to finish seventh. A fantastic opening leg by Georgie Gleeson set the fastest St Catherine's time of the day, 17.45, while a strong finish by Cross Country Captain Ella Swann secured the team the little victory over MGGS.

It was fantastic to once again see St Catherine's take part in this event and I thank all the girls and their families for coming along and getting involved in the day. Thank you to our Cross Country coaches; Ms Susan Hobson, Mr Harry Roubin and Miss Tilly Schoeffel and also to those staff and Old Girls who assisted in the running of the event on the day.



Cabrini Emergency Working with St Catherine's Families

We are happy to announce Cabrini Malvern's Emergency Department has offered pupils from our School a heavily discounted rate of \$205 (8.00am to 8.00pm) and \$240 (8.00pm to 8.00am weekdays and on weekends). We hope this discount of 50% will assist the families in our School community and enable them to receive the best possible treatment for their children.

To obtain this discount, your child or carer will simply need to show their current student card or supply School details when attending the Emergency Department. The discount of 50% applies to the attendance fee only and would not include any further out of pocket expenses such as X-rays and blood tests. Cabrini is a private, Catholic, not-for-profit healthcare service that does not rely on funding from government or the Catholic Church. Therefore, they must charge fees for emergency medical care. Unfortunately health insurers do not cover emergency attendances, so they rely on these fees to cover our costs. They understand that their fees of \$410 (8.00am to 8.00 pm) and \$480 (8.00pm to 8.00am weekdays and on weekends) to attend their Emergency Department can be prohibitive to some families.

Cabrini has extensive services in emergency and children's care. They have an emergency department (ED) open 24/7 staffed by senior emergency doctors trained in paediatric medicine. They have a dedicated paediatrics area within the ED and a children's ward in the unfortunate event that a child needs admission to hospital. A large group of local paediatricians are on-call every day of the year and they have access to a large network of paediatricians for appointments. Cabrini has dedicated, technologically advanced surgical theatres and paediatric surgeons on call should they be required. They pride themselves on their caring and sensitivity to our patients' needs, and work to make a visit to the ED as stress-free as possible for children and parents. 'Whitelist' St Catherine's School

To ensure email communications the School sends reach your personal or work email account, it is highly recommended that you 'whitelist' the School email domain. In order to whitelist emails from the School, you can usually specify a domain that these emails come from, and mark them as a Safe Sender, or similar. In this case, the domain would be '@stcatherines.net.au'. Both email providers and programs use 'whitelist' principles, but may accomplish white-listing differently. If you work for a company who manage SPAM centrally please ask the relevant ICT Manager to whitelist the School domain. Here are instructions for a few popular email providers to help set this up for personal email accounts.

Outlook

- 1. Go to the Tools>Options menu
- 2. Select the Preferences tab, click Junk E-mail.
- 3. On the Safe Senders tab, click Add.
- 4. In the Add address, enter '@stcatherines.net.au'
- 5. Click OK.

Gmail

- 1. From the top of your Gmail page, click the link to 'Create a filter'
- 2. In the 'From' field, type '@stcatherines.net.au'
- 3. Click 'Next Step'
- 4. Check the box that says 'Never send it to Spam'.
- 5. Click 'Create Filter'

Hotmail

- 1. Go to your Inbox
- 2. Near the upper-right corner of the page, click Options -> More options
- 3. Under the Junk e-mail heading, click Safe and blocked senders
- 4. Click Safe senders
- 5. In the box marked "Sender or domain to mark safe" type '@stcatherines.net.au' and click Add to list

Yahoo!

- 1. Open your mailbox and click on Mail Options (upper right hand corner).
- 2. Select Filters (bottom left corner).
- 3. Click the Add link on the Filters page.
- 4. Add a name for your filter (St Catherine's School)
- 5. Select 'contains' in the From Header dropdown. Add '@stcatherines.net.au' to the adjacent text field.
- 6. Next to 'Move the message to', select 'Inbox' under the pull-down menu.
- 7. Click the 'Add Filter' button.
